TIM AND KAREN SCHLAX



Tim was born on March 19, 1938 in Salem, Wisconsin and lived in this small farming community until after graduating from high school in 1956. He was the elder son of a family of 3 children; 1 sister and 1 brother. His father worked 16 years for the Nash Corporation and eventually owned his own business as a modern day blacksmith/repairman. He could fix anything, but repairing lawn mowers and welding farm equipment were his specialty. As a teenager, Tim would sit for hours reading library electronics books, memorizing everything he could. In addition, while growing up in school, Tim was often in the same classroom with higher grade level students which greatly fostered his ability to learn at an advanced pace younger in life.

Tim did not have a typical childhood. He was diagnosed at birth with Cerebral Palsy which is an incurable neurological condition that causes mild to severe impairment in movement, thought, speech and/or coordination. Quite frankly, he was not supposed to live. However, Mom was a homemaker and worked as a surgical nurse in a local hospital. Tim credits his Mom as being strong willed and for having a huge impact on his life by encouraging him to do whatever it takes to succeed in life...there would be no excuses.

Tim had no problem with pulling grades in school. In fact, he excelled and received awards at science fairs while progressing through high school. Electronics became his passion. His notable academic achievements from 1956 - 1961 included a Bachelors and Masters Degree in Electrical Engineering from Marquette University before he was hired by AC Electronic in June of 1961 (later became Delco Electronics). In 1963, General Motors, through the mentorship of Fred Best, awarded Tim a GM Fellowship to MIT (Cambridge, MA) where he earned his PhD EE in September of 1967, majoring in semi-conductors. Now, let's take a look at what Tim's been able to achieve through his professional work career.

WORK HISTORY

Transferred from AC Electronics to the GM Engineering Staff in February 1972

Promoted to Staff Engineer in September 1977

Project Manager of various microcomputer/electronic activities from 1972-87

Manager of Advanced Product Engineering (APE) computer facilities interfacing with EDS 1988-92

Project Manager of automotive safety activities including forward looking radar and NITSA sponsored projects

Retired in November 1997 as GM Staff Engineer working on advanced safety projects

MOST MEMORABLE EVENTS & LEGACY AT GENERAL MOTORS

1973-74. Project Leader and computer hardware & software architect of the first 2 microprocessor controlled vehicles; published a paper at the 2nd Convergence '76 Conference on this project; received the "Best Paper Award" at the Convergence '78 Conference.

1977-79. Technical Assistant to Delco Electronics in selecting the 1st microprocessor supplier.

1975-82. GM Explorer Scout Leader of a microcomputer project (model railroad & piano controllers); Staff Explorer Scout Co-coordinator.

1974-84. GMI thesis sponsor for many GMI students on various electronic projects; co-authored paper on a vehicle dot matrix display approach at a Display Conference in California.

So, what's Tim doing these days to keep busy? Tim continues to work on correcting the way he signs his name...writes upside down and left handed...not going to happen, but don't bet on it! He works out an hour a day on a doctor prescribed regiment to keep flexible in order to prevent being confined to a wheelchair. His hobbies include computer related projects, camera technology selection and computer photo expertise. Tim basically is Karen's technology assistant supporting her photography activities. At the end of this article you will find a selection of Karen's photographs that Tim and Karen have produced from their travels around the world.


